Forces vives – Civil Society

<p>Summary of Facts</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ The Special Envoy is committed to engaging civil society in the region to build constituencies under the PSC Framework that can hold governments accountable and promote a shared long-term vision for peace and prosperity across the region. ▪ The Special Envoy and his representatives have met and worked with civil society actors in many of the countries of the region, as well as with the ICGLR Regional Civil Society Forum. ▪ The Special Envoy had initially focussed on bringing together civil society actors from Burundi, the DRC, Rwanda and Uganda. National workshops on the PSC Framework were held in those four countries in August/September 2014. ▪ In April 2015, a regional workshop in Entebbe brought together delegates from the four key countries, as well as from Kenya, Zambia, the ICGLR Regional Civil Society Forum and representatives from organizations receiving grants from the Women’s Platform. The regional workshop succeeded in: (i) strengthening the civil society commitment to the PSC Framework; (ii) developing a strategy and concrete action points for civil society support to the SESG Strategic Roadmap for the implementation of the PSC Framework; and, (iii) providing support and recommendations for the reactivation of the ICGLR Regional Civil Society Forum.
<p>Analysis</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Civil society actors in the region play a crucial role in bringing sustainable peace and security to the Great Lakes and seem keen to support the Special Envoy, and participate in the implementation of the PSC Framework. Those who have had the opportunity, appreciated the direct contact with the Special Envoy and/or his Office. ▪ It is important to note, however, that the number of civil society actors in the region is large, and it is impossible to ensure all civil society actors are included in O/SESG activities. At the same time, the vast majority lack awareness of the PSC Framework and appropriate efforts will be taken to publicize the Framework objectives in the region. ▪ Most civil society organizations depend extensively on assistance (technical and financial) from international organizations. Lack of resources and lack of capacity can hinder the effectiveness of civil society actions in the implementation of the Framework, including monitoring the



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	commitments made by their governments.	
Next Steps	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ O/SESG intends to work with civil society actors in the Great Lakes countries, and in particular the ICGLR Regional Civil Society Forum, to move forward on the recommendations made during the regional workshop. ▪ O/SESG will also engage civil society actors from the CEPGL countries in a workshop on the reactivation of the CEPGL. 	
Messaging	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Commend civil society for its attempts to encourage cross-border activities. ▪ Effective implementation of the PSC Framework will require commitment and strong leadership from civil society to ensure sustained focus on the needs and priorities of affected populations in the Great Lakes region. ▪ Continue to encourage civil society actors in the region to share experiences, identify common issues and challenges, and develop concrete ideas to support the implementation of the PSC Framework.
