IRISH WILL COME BACK

5th Inf Gp arrives next month

IRELAND has announced that it will replace its contingent with the United Nations Force in Cyprus although in a reduced number of men.

Consequently, as the 42nd Irish Infantry Battalion continued to turn over positions and patrol duties to the 1st Bn, The Grenadier Guards, of the British Contingent, approximately 500 officers and other ranks were being assembled in Ireland to form the 5th Infantry Group which is scheduled to join UNFICYP ranks in October.

The advance party of the 5th Infantry Group is expected to arrive in Nicosia between 4 and 5 of next month and the main body should begin to join UNFICYP about 19 October.

With the arrival of the new Irish contingent, a new deployment of some of the Force is expected to take place.

In the meantime, on 27 September UNFICYP's Paphos District ceased to be operational as the members of the British Contingent completed their take-over from the Irish 42nd Battalion.

On the occasion of the turn-over of duties in Paphos, the Force Chief of Staff, Brig. A. J. Wilson, acting on behalf of the Force Commander who is away for a brief visit to Europe, sent the following personal message to

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Rotations in full swing

Rotation of the different national contingents with the United Nations Force in Cyprus is in full swing — and farewells and greetings are the almost daily order of the day throughout the Island.

Rotation of the Canadian Contingent began Sunday afternoon with the arrival of a 125-man advance party from the 2nd Bn, Canadian Guards on board a Royal Canadian Air Force Yukon that flew them here from Trenton, Ontario. The advance party of the 1st. Bn, Queen's Own Rifles of Canada — returning to Canada after a six-month tour with UNFICYP — left on the same craft on the way home. About 900 officers and men will fly each way in 11 flights beginning 26 September and ending 7 October.

Macdonald named Commander UNIPOM

MAJ. Gen. Bruce F. Macdonald, MDSO CD, who, as Brigadier B. F. Macdonald, was the last Commander of UNFICYP's Nicosia Zone — from 15 April until 30 August when it ceased to be operation — left Nicosia on Sunday evening for Beirut en route to head the new United Nations India-Pakistan

Observation Mission (UNIPOM).

It was a big night for the popular UNFICYP officer when he received news on Friday last of both promotion and appointment.

And, it was a big evening on Sunday when Canada's High Commissioner to Cyprus, Mr. Thomas Wainman-Wood, the Force COS, Brigadier A. J. Wilson, and other UNFICYP officials, joined the Commander of the Canadian Contingent with UNFICYP, Col. J. L. Drewry and other Canadian officers in toasting Maj. Gen. Macdonald at the Nicosia airport minutes before his departure for Beirut from where he proceeded to Cairo and New Delhi en route to his new area of U.N. duty.

Speaking to reporters at the airport, Maj. Gen. Macdonald said he was facing a "very challenging and stimulating appointment". He said that however

DO's and DON'Ts

● Do remember your road discipline.

● Keep to your own side and only cross road markings when you are moving into another lane.

● Before doing so give signals to other vehicles.

● When approaching a junction make sure that you are in the right lane.

● You should never overtake at or when approaching:

- a junction
- a narrow or hump back bridge
- a corner or bend
- a convoy
- a pedestrian crossing
- where there is a double white line

—when another vehicle is about to overtake you

—when the road is slippery and wet

—at the crest of a hill

—when you can not do so continuously

● Remember nothing is more important than the security of your passengers and your own.

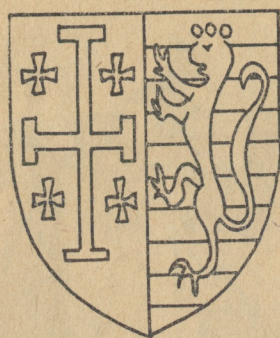

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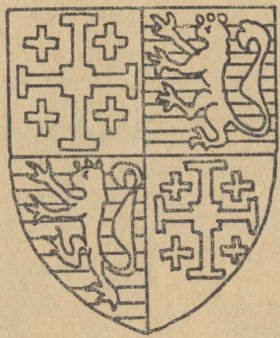

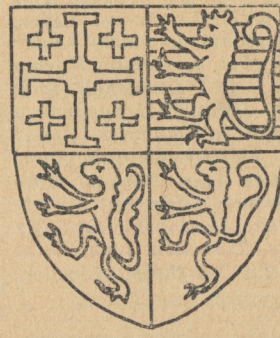

The Lusignan Dynasty - Marshalling

THE original intention of a coat of arms was the practical one of personal identification. Marshalling is primarily the combination of two or more coats of arms on one shield to indicate the alliance of families by marriage or by descent. It is also employed to indicate the holding of office or land, or — as we shall see — claim on land.

The Lusignans were kings of Jerusalem and Cyprus and they continued to use this title after the fall of Acre in 1291. On some very rare silver coins from the beginning of the 14th century you will see this double monarchy displayed in one shield. The shield is divided palewise (lengthwise) and in each of the two halves an entire coat of arms is shown: Jerusalem and Lusignan. This method of combining arms is called Impalement.

Another way of marshalling is by quartering. An early 14th century stone carving showing Jerusalem as the more important in 1 and 4 and Lusignan in 2 and 3 could once be seen above the entrance to the old Archbishop's Palace in Nicosia — where it is now I don't know, probably in a museum.

In 1367 Peter I was recognized King of Armenia. The coat of arms of Armenia which he took over was, a red lion in a golden field (a French 13th century source has a "Leopard lione" i.e. the head of the lion is seen 'en face'), this coat of arms was soon placed in the 3rd quarter, and in the 4th there was at the same time placed another red lion in a silver field. It is believed that this lion stands for Cyprus and this is probably correct. Normally quarters are occupied in order of importance and as the order of importance of the quarters is 1, 4, 2, 3 we get

Jerusalem, Cyprus, Lusignan and Armenia which sounds very logical. This coat of arms can be seen at Kolossi Castle and I think it is also displayed above one of the entrances of Kyrenia Castle. I shall be glad to hear from readers who have found it elsewhere.

According to the heraldic rules a man does not require to display all the quarterings to which he is entitled and with the introduction of marshalling the custom of displaying the individual coats of arms did not cease. At Bella Paise there is a marble lintel above the entrance to the rectory bearing three shields:

Jerusalem and Lusignan quartered; Jerusalem; and Lusignan. At the same place you will find two key-stones in the vaults of the cloisters, one with the Lusignan arms, the other with just a lion — probably for Cyprus. Above a door near to the entrance to the church you will see two shields, the one to the right is the Lusignan coat of arms—much defaced but probably as old as late 13th century, the one to the left is a bad modern reconstruction.

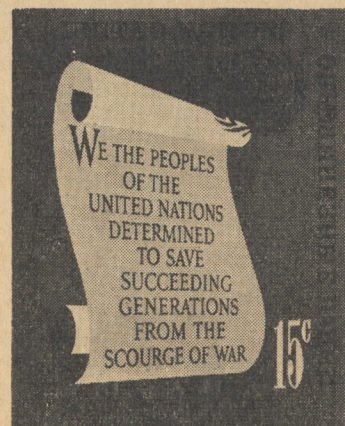

UN Postal Administration to further issue in the late October

The United Nations Postal Administration will re-issue its 15-cent and 20-cent regular stamps on 25 October 1965, on which date the existing stamps of the same denomination will be withdrawn from sale. The new designs will replace those originally issued in 1951.

The 15-cent stamp will be printed in photogravure (olive green, yellow, brown and black) by the Government Printing Office, Vienna, Austria, in an initial quantity of 1,500,000.

It was designed by Olav S. Mathiesen (Denmark) and will measure 27.5 mm. horizontally x 32.8 mm vertical-

ly, perforation to perforation.

The design depicts a scroll with the words "We the peoples of the United Nations determined to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war", the UN seal and "United Nations" in the five official languages. Four marginal inscriptions will appear on each sheet — two at the top and two at the bottom — and will consist of the United Nations seal with the date "1965" beneath it.

The 20-cent stamp will also be printed by the Government Printing Office, Vienna, in photogravure (dark blue, light blue, red

Festgudstjeneste i Maronit - kirken

DE i sidste nummer af "The Blue Beret" omtalte forhandlinger mellem feltpraesten og biskop Foradaris om laan af maroniternes kirke i Nicosia til danske gudstjenester blev foert til en lykkelig afslutning, og i Soendags fandt den foerste gudstjeneste sted.

Den maronittiske kirke staar den romersk-katolske kirke naer, idet dog der er den forskel, at hvor man i den romersk-katolske kirke anvender latin som det liturgiske sprog, der anvender maronitterne arabisk.

Det er nok foerste gang i historien, at en maronittisk kirke er stillet til raadighed for en dansk lutherskevangelsk menighed.

Den maronittiske menighed paa Cypren taeiler omkring 6000 medlemmer og Vor Frue Kirke i Nicosia er stiftets domkirke. Det er en moderne bygning, som er reist for midler tilvejebragt af biskop Foradaris. Kirken ejer ogsaa den naerliggende nye forretningsjendom.

Gudstjenesten fik et smukt forloeb. Biskoppen var til stede og talte til den danske menighed fra praedikestolen paa fransk — oversat til dansk af major Liljefalk. Biskoppen gav udtryk for, at selv om der var forskelligheder mellem den maronittiske kirke og den danske, saa var det dog begge kristne kirker med et og samme maal. Biskoppen fandt det helt naturligt, at han havde stillet sin kirke til vores raadighed, og oenskede den danske menighed hjerteligt velkommen.

Pastor Berg takkede biskop Foradaris og praedikede over dagens evangelium. Efter praedikenen var der altergang, og som den sidste salme sang man B. S. Ingemanns Dejlig er Jorden.

Kirken har inter orgel, men med overlæge Jespersen ved det lille transportable harmonium lykkedes det alligevel at fylde det store kirkerum med de toner som vi holder af, og som vi kender fra gudstjenester i Danmark.

Finnerne har rotation

Det finske kontingent er for tiden ved at blive afloest. Den 19 SEP ankom det nye holds forkommando paa ialt 35 mand, og samme dag forlod 13 mand Cypren.

Hovedstyrken afloeses i dagene 28 SEP til 2 OKT. Det nye kontingents styrke bliver paa cirka 950 mand — lidt mindre end DANCON's styrke.

Ogsaa det canadiske kontingent er ved at blive udskiftet. 11/Canadian Guards vil erstatte 1/Queen's Own Rifles.

Knud den Helliges billede i Bethlehem

KOMMER De paa orlovstur til Jordan, maa De naturligvis ogsaa til Bethlehem. I fodselskirken, som er det selvoelgelige maal for en udflugt til Bethlehem, findes det aeldste eksisterende maleri af en dansk konge.

Kirkerummet er delt i et midterskib og to sideskibe ved to rækker af soejler. Naar man har vaennet sig til det afdaempede lys i kirken, kan man skelne, at der er malet helgenbilleder paa soejlerne, og det ene af disse billeder forestiller Knud den Hellige. Billederne menes malede omkring aar 1130, muligvis af en armenisk kunstner. Paa soejlen ved siden af ser vi Norges kongehelgen, Olav den Hellige, og saa kunne man vente at finde Sveriges Erik paa en tredje soejle, men det er ikke tilfaeldet, fordi Erik endnu ikke var blevet myrdet i 1130 da billederne blev til.

Knud den Hellige var foedt omkring aar 1040 som soen af Svend Estridsen. Han blev konge i 1080. Han var naeppe nogen populær konge. Foruden den laenge kendte tiende-afgift indfoerte han personskatter, og foelgen heraf blev et bondeoprør hvorunder kongen blev draebt i St. Albani kirke i Odense i 1086. Paa den tid var der engelske munke i Odense, og en af dem skrev en forherligende legende om kongen med det resultat at kongen blev helgenkaaret af paven i 1101. Allerede en menneskealder senere bliver hans billede da malet i kirken i Bethlehem — et smukt vidnesbyrd om betydelig dansk deltagelse i de foerste korstog.

Irerne sender alligeval nyt kontingent

Observatoerer til Indien - Pakistan

DEn tidligere chef for Nicosia Zone, den canadiske brigadier Bruce Macdonald er blevet udnævnt til generalmajor og skal nu til Indien — Pakistan som chef for den nyoprettede observatoergruppe UNIPOM (United Nations India — Pakistan Observation Mission). Missionens opgave er at overvaage overholdes stilstandsbetingelserne overholdes og at begge parter traekker deres styrker tilbage til de stillinger de havde foer urolighedernes udbrud.

Det danske bidrag til denne mission er ti officerer, og blandt dem er chefen for C—Coy DANCON II Major J. A. N. Suenson fra Gardehussarerne.

Ja sehän on sentään pääasia, vaikka jalkineiden puhtaudessa yms. usein on ollut toivomisen varaa. Sen ovat todenneet ja siitä kiitoksensa lausuneet myös pataljoonassa vierailleet ulkomaiset havannoitsijat.

Tarkea Vaihe Elamassa.

Kotimaahan palaavien joukossa on monia, jotka ovat olleet Yhtyneitten Kansakuntien Kyproksen turvajoukkojen palveluksessa kak-sitoista jopa kahdeksantoista kuukautta. Tämä ihmisen elämässä sinänsä suhteellisen lyhyt aika on varmaankin monien kohdalla muodostunut merkitykselliseksi kuin monet muut vastaavanpituiset var-haisemmin tai tulevai-suudessa.

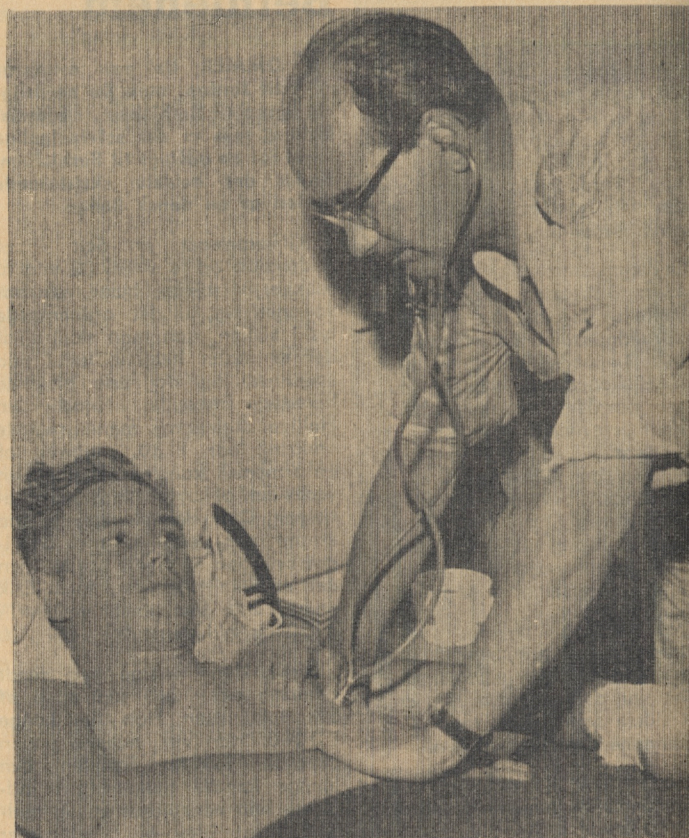

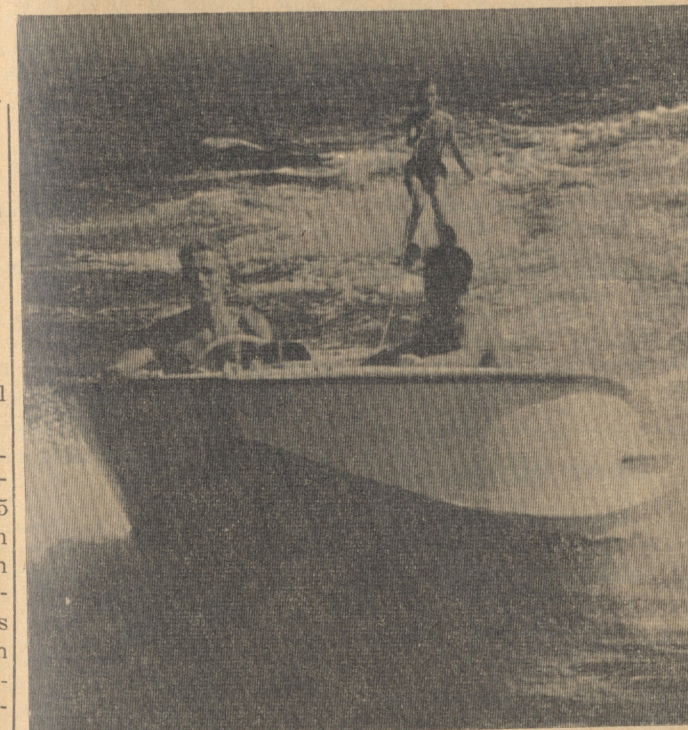

'A' Sqn clock up three years in Middle East

Consequent upon the re-deployment of U.N. Forces, 'A' Squadron 14/20 King's Hussars has withdrawn from Lefka District to concentrate in their camp at Zygi prior to taking up a new role in Limassol Zone. The Squadron has, to date, served over three years on their current tour in the Middle East, and has had the most varied and interesting time of the three Sabre Squadrons of the Regiment.

Commencing their overseas tour in Benghazi, they settled down to intense training in the Libyan Desert. This period proved very interesting to the young regular soldiers, who operated on the same battlefields — still littered with the relics of war — across which the British 8th Army had fought over 20 years earlier.

Then came a move to Tripoli, and the Squadron had their first taste of an independent role; detached from the parental eye of the C.O., under command of Major R.E.D. Harris MC. More training followed with 1st Bn The Green Howards, with Tripoli itself offering varied facilities for the leisure hours.

It was with keen anticipation that the Squadron set sail in late April '65 for Cyprus, there to don blue berets and become an integral part of the peace keeping force. They quickly adapted themselves to their new role, and soon established friendly relations with an international array of soldiers and civilians. Although the members of the Squadron had spent more time under the hot sun than their new contemporaries, they showed no lack of enthusiasm and energy.

July found most of the Squadron actively engaged in Lefka District, with Zygi men relax together.

Camp nevertheless maintained under command of Captain Peter Whittington as a base area. This division of the Squadron created administrative problems for their Quartermaster Sergeant Bury, whilst others rapidly set about arranging suitable relaxation for those coming back on internal rotation.

A free barrel of beer is provided on these occasions, and a very convivial atmosphere prevails as Officers, N.C.Os and men relax together.

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ron of the Royal Canadian Dragoons also will be rotated at this time — an advance party of 14 arrived on Monday afternoon.

Commanding the Canadian Guards from Camp Petawawa, Ontario will be Lt. Col. C.V. Carlson. The Recce Squadron of the R.C.D. from Camp Cagetown, N.B. is commanded

by Maj. W.L. Conrad. Serving in lieu of one infantry company of the Canadian Guards will be a battery of the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery, commanded by Maj. W.D. Creighton — but the gunners will be deployed in an infantry role and will not be armed with the usual field artillery.

On Monday, an advance party consisting of 80 officers and other ranks of the 1st Bn The Royal Highland Fusiliers arrived at Akrotiri.

The Royal Highland Fusiliers, commanded by Lt. Col. G.C.R.L. Pender, MBE, are due to take over UNFICYP duties from the 1st Bn The Grenadier Guards who, after a six-month tour with UNFICYP, are returning to Germany. The main body of the Royal Highland Fusiliers will arrive by air between 4 and 8 October.

Yesterday, Tuesday, the main body of the new Finnish Contingent began to arrive in Cyprus and the turn-over is expected to be completed by the end of this week. (See Blue Beret, 22 Sept. p. 1).

Today, an advance party of about 40 officers and other ranks are expected to arrive from Sweden to start the rotation of this country's national contingent with the Force. The main body of the new Swedish battalion is to arrive in the Island between 15 and 23 October.

And (as mentioned on P. 1) the Irish Contingent will be replaced with a 500-man strong 5th Irish Infantry Group scheduled to start arriving here next week.

'Non-Proliferation vital' - U Thant

AS the U. N. General Assembly began its meeting in New York, the Secretary-General, U Thant, made public his annual survey of major international problems — in the Introduction to his Annual Report to the Assembly.

In it he said that preventing a further spread of nuclear weapons was the most urgent question of the present time. He also urged the extension of the partial nuclear test ban of 1963 to underground tests, and Assembly approval of proposals for a world disarmament conference open to all nations. There was little hope for progress, U Thant said, without participation of all major military powers.

The Secretary-General said that the high hopes aroused by the 1963 disarmament agreements had been greatly diminished by the worsening international situation — and particularly by the escalation of the conflict in Viet-Nam.

U Thant urged that clear rules be worked out to guide future peace-keeping operations, particularly as to their financing.

Meanwhile, he said, the financial situation of the United Nations remained precarious.

The Secretary-General said that U.N. peace-keeping efforts in the Palestine area, and, and more recently in

Cyprus, had played an indispensable role in keeping the peace, but should not obscure the need for fundamental settlements.

In connection with the U.N. Force in Cyprus, the Secretary-General made public another report later in the week in which he said that if substantial pledges for the upkeep of the United Nations peace-keeping Force in Cyprus were not received soon, the United Nations might not be able to meet its commitments to reimburse the countries supplying men and material for their extra costs.

Assembly opens general debate

Last week, while the United Nations was waiting to see if a ceasefire would be achieved between India and Pakistan, the General Assembly opened its XX annual session at United Nations Headquarters in New York.

By week's end, the Assembly had taken action to approve for itself an agenda of 105 different issues — including the "Question of Cyprus" — and allocated them to its various committees.

In his first address to the Assembly, Mr. Fanfani spoke of the "grave hours the whole world was at present going through" with battles bleeding Asia and with forces of United Nations members involved. He said the United Nations must act to put an end to this "terrible reality".

Mr. Fanfani also urged new efforts to ban all nuclear weapons tests and to prevent the further dissemination of nuclear weapons. Another urgent task, he said, was to bridge the growing gap between rich and poor nations.

The General Assembly later in the week opened its overall debate on the world issues of the day. Among the first speakers were the heads of the United States and the Soviet Union delegations.

Addressing the Assembly on Thursday, Ambassador Arthur Goldberg of the United States said the India-Pakistan cease-fire proved once again that the United Nations was a decisive peace-maker.

The U.S. Representative also declared that the People's Republic of China, by word and deed, proved she stood for the very antithesis of the United Nations and was unfit for U.N. membership.

Mr. Goldberg said in South Viet-Nam his country was "simply helping the nation resist Communist aggression", and reaffirmed that the U.S. was ready for unconditional negotiations, but said there had so far been no reply from the opposing side.

On disarmament, Mr. Goldberg said the most urgent task was to halt the spread of nuclear weapons. He also urged steps to freeze and possible cut back military nuclear material and delivery vehicles.

The U.S. delegate pledged continued support for United Nations economic aid programmes and said his country was willing to supply a larger amount of capital through multi-lateral channels. Stressing his Government's efforts to build a great society for its own citizens, Mr. Goldberg concluded with the hope that 20 years hence the United Na-

tions could look back on a generation of accomplishment in developing a great society of and for all men.

Speaking in the Assembly's policy debate, Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko:

- Placed before the General Assembly a draft treaty that would prevent atomic weapons from spreading beyond the present five nuclear powers.

- Introduced a draft declaration against foreign intervention in the internal affairs of other states.

- Expressed great satisfaction at the Indian-Pakistani cease-fire.

Under the Soviet non-proliferation nuclear draft, nuclear States would withhold atomic weapons from non-nuclear States—and from military units of those States even if these were under an allied command. Non-nuclear States would bind themselves not to acquire atomic weapons or to be "associated" with them through alliances.

The Soviet non-intervention declaration would be directed against armed or other interference, particularly when designed to curb a national independence struggle. Mr. Gromyko cited as one instance of such intrusion the U.S. action in Viet-Nam — which he again described as aggression.

On the Indian-Pakistani cease-fire, Mr. Gromyko praised the role played by the Secretary-General, U Thant, and the United Nations in ending the bloodshed which, he declared, could not advance the interests of either side, but there were "third parties" — not otherwise identified — eager to see India and Pakistan bogged down in mutual enmity and thus more vulnerable to their designs.

New home for Trade Board?

In Geneva, the United Nations Trade and Development Board decided to hold a one-day special session at United Nations Headquarters in New York next month to recommend a permanent location of the Secretariat of the Conference on Trade and Development.

India - Pakistan accept UN's cease fire order

A cease-fire between India and Pakistan demanded by the United Nations Security Council was accepted last week by both countries. India's acceptance, conditioned by similar acceptance by Pakistan, was received by the Secretary-General, U Thant, on the night of 20 September. Pakistan's acceptance was conveyed verbally to the Council by its Foreign Minister, Mr. Bhutto, minutes before the 3.00 a.m. (New York time) deadline on Wednesday, 22 September, set by the Security Council in its resolution adopted on Monday morning, 20 September, which also demanded withdrawal of armed personnel to positions held before fighting broke out early in August.

India requested that the Council set a new deadline in view of the late hour of Pakistan's reply to enable it to issue appropriate orders to its field commanders.

Following brief consultations, the Council President, Ambassador Arthur Goldberg of the United States, announced that the members were agreed that the two parties be called upon to implement the cease-fire as soon as possible, and in any case not later than 1800 hours (New York time) the same day.

In announcing Pakistan's acceptance of the demanded cease-fire, Pakistan's Foreign Minister restated his Government's resolve to secure self-determination for the people of Jammu and Kashmir.

Acceptance of the cease-fire was welcomed by the President of the General Assembly, Mr. Amintore Fanfani, who said it allowed the Assembly to begin its work under happy auspices. The President said he was sure he interpreted the sentiments of all Members of the Assembly in congratulating the parties for their cooperative spirit.

In the 20 September resolution adopted by the Council, the Secretary-General was asked to provide necessary assistance to ensure supervision of the cease-fire and withdrawal.

To carry out this task, U Thant took steps to set up a team of about 100 military observers along with about 60 supporting personnel. An advance party of 30 observers on loan from the Palestine truce observation mission left for the subcontinent on Thursday. Steps also were taken to strengthen the U.N. military observer team in Kashmir.

In a report to the Security Council issued later in the week, the Secretary-General said that five countries had already promised observers for the Indian-

West Pakistani border. U Thant added that six countries were making a total of 50 observers available to reinforce the Kashmir group.

Finland makes further UNFICYP contribution

The Government of Finland will make a further contribution of \$50,000 to meet the costs of the United Nations Peace-Keeping Force in Cyprus.

In a letter dated 16 September, received by the Secretary-General, U Thant, the Permanent Representative of Finland, Mr. Max Jacobson, said that his Government's decision to make this further contribution was subject to parliamentary approval.
