GENERAL THIMAYYA CONFINED TO BED

The Commander of UNFICYP, General K.S. Thimayya has been confined to bed suffering from a heavy cold and overwork. The following statement was issued by a UN spokesman on Saturday:-

Maltese may provide a UN peace-keeping force

SPEAKING in the General Assembly on Thursday, Mr. Giorgio Borg Olivier, the Prime Minister of Malta said that his country would provide a unit for future UN peace-keeping operations.

Mr. Borg Olivier told members that his newly independent country constituted an island link between Europe and Africa. Although it was probably the smallest nation in the UN it would be able to provide a unit for peace-keeping operations he said.

"General K. S. Thimayya the Commander of UNFICYP has been advised by his medical advisers to remain in bed for the next ten days.

Study operations Says Danish Foreign Minister

DENMARK'S Foreign Minister Per Haekkerup, speaking in the General debate of the UN General Assembly in New York on Thursday, urged a thorough study of the complex problem of UN peace-keeping operations. He said that the issue was of particular interest to his country because it was setting aside close to one thousand men for service with the UN pursuant to any lawful United Nations decision.

Readjustment in Nicosia Zone UNFICYP Deployment

A readjustment of the United Nations Force within Nicosia Zone, to allow more functional operational control within the Zone, took place on Wednesday, 9 December. The Canadian, Danish and Finnish contingents of UNFICYP were involved in the redeployment.

Change on 'Green Line'

The elements of the Canadian contingent in the Nicosia suburb of Trakhanas were replaced on

the "Green Line" by troops of the Finnish contingent whose responsibilities in the NE section of the Zone have been reduced.

Canadian Guards

The northern sector of Nicosia Zone including the coast line, the Kyrenia range and the Kyrenia road is now included in the operational area of the 1st Battalion, the Canadian Guards, who relieved Danish troops in the Ayia Irini area and Finnish troops in the NE part of the Zone.

Southern areas including some portions of the Troodos Mountains will continue to be within the Danish area.

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FAREWELL TO LARNACA

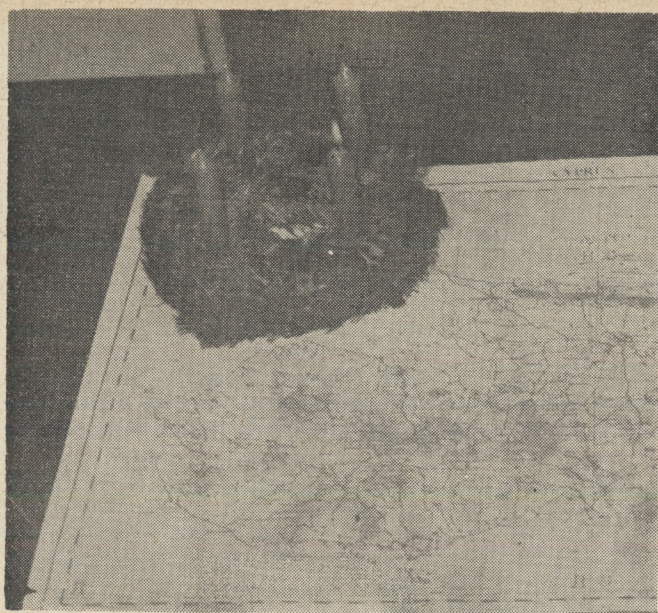

U Thant back in 10 days

UN Secretary General, U Thant, who entered hospital last Friday will be back in his office within seven to ten days said Ghana's Mr Alex Quaison-Sackey, the President of the General Assembly at Wednesday's meeting.

Mr Quaison-Sackey told members that the Secretary General had been re-X-rayed and that the diagnosis of a peptic ulcer of the duodenum had been confirmed. He added that the ulcer was very small and showed good signs of healing, and said that U Thant would remain in hospital for another seven to ten days to allow for complete healing before returning to his office.

Good Wishes

In response to requests by a large number of delegations, Mr Quaison-Sackey said that he had drafted a message of good wishes to the Secretary General on behalf of the Assembly. The message expressed their wish for his full and speedy recovery and said that all delegations were hopeful that he would soon be able to take his place in their midst again so they would be able to avail themselves of his wise counsel.

It all began in 1953 when Kent Sjögren went to Australia. First he got a job on a farm and later in car spraying workshop. But having a strong zest for adventure he got rather tired of these jobs and put an advertisement into "The West Australian", a local paper.

He had a hungry eye for the hard pearl diving game and the advertisement read something like this:

"Young Swede wants job in pearl lugger in Broome".

An Australian senator by the name of Malcolm Scott, descendant of the famous writer Sir Walter Scott, sent an answer to the advertisement. Together with his brother Wally Scott he was running a pearl diving fleet of 12 boats with about 30 professional divers.

Ken Sjögren became the first white man in the company actually doing the diving job. The divers were paid on a piecework basis and therefore everyone was forced to work hard in order to secure a decent living.

Dawn Start

"Work usually started at dawn as soon as the first sun-beam emerged above the horizon", Kent Sjögren tells the Blue Beret. "There were two or three divers in each vessel and two assistants to each diver. We worked all day until dusk with only short break of about a quarter of an hour or twenty minutes between each dive".

"Most of the shells were to be found at a depth of about 100 feet. Most people have a notion that the pearls give the best money. This is not true. In the long run you make a better living selling the mother-of-pearl".

"Of course, if you are lucky, you can come across beautiful pearls. And some divers mainly go in search of such. The best chances to find shells with nice pearls are at the coral reefs. Those shells which produce the best mother-of-pearl are found where the sea-floor consists of sand".

Strain

"The pearl luggers used to stay at sea for up to 6 to 8 weeks at a time. We made only short stays at a base camp. We used to work in this manner 9 months a year. It was hard work, especially due to the psychological strain. I was particularly aware of this during and after diving in very deep waters".

The maximum depth that Kent Sjögren experienced was about 250 feet, so deep below the surface the pearl divers

Annexure — "Myth" says Costopoulos

The Greek Foreign Minister, Mr Stavros Costopoulos, speaking in the General Assembly on Wednesday, dismissed the notion of the annexure of Cyprus by Greece as "a myth."

Mr. Costopoulos said that his country supported full independence for Cyprus while recognising that the rights of the Turkish minority must be protected: "The notion that Greece had any idea of annexing Cyprus by force was a myth," he said. His country's only aim was to let the Cypriot people determine their own future.

HUMOUR CORNER

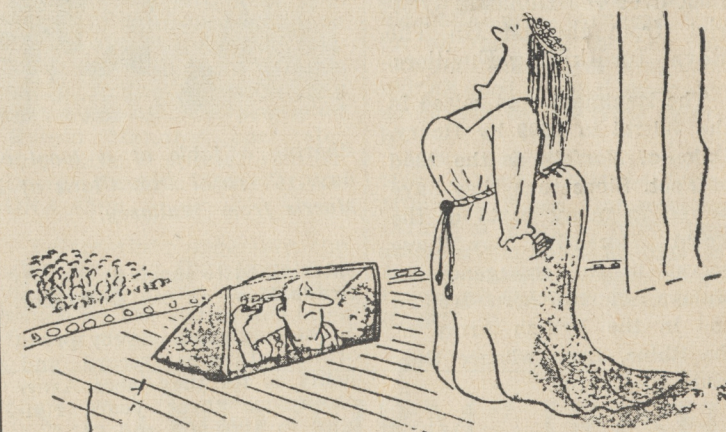

UNITS WITH THE UN

Each week the 'Blue Beret' will run a short feature on one or two of the units of all contingents attached to the UN in Cyprus. We start off with the 1st Bn the 22nd (Cheshire) Regt and Ajax Squadron, 2nd Royal Tank Regiment.

1st BATTALION THE 22nd (CHESHIRE) REGIMENT

THE 1st Battalion the 22nd (Cheshire) Regiment came to Cyprus at the beginning of October and took over the Limassol District from the 1st Bn The Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers.

The Regiment was raised in the Wirral in 1689 by Henry, Duke of Norfolk as the 22nd of Foot. Since then they have served in many parts of the world. Recently they have served in the emergency in Malaya, in Northern Ireland and in the British Army of the Rhine, from whence they came to Cyprus.

Good relations with the local population

Their duties in the Limassol District are those of a normal United Nations Force such as the manning of check points and patrolling of villages. There has been little trouble in the area, and relations with the local population are good - as our pictures show. Some National Guard officers were

"STAND FIRM" IRISH MINISTER TELLS UN

DR. Frank Aiken, the Irish Foreign Minister told the UN General Assembly that it should "stand firm by its rights" in the UN financial and constitutional crises, and not to allow the establishment of "financial veto" Mr. Aiken was speaking in the general debate on Wednesday.

On the subject of Chinese

representation in the United Nations, Mr. Aiken said that however desirable it might be to have the People's Republic of China as a member of the Security Council, particularly since it had become the world's fifth nuclear power, it would be intolerable that this be done at the expense of Taiwan by excluding it from the UN.

NEWS IN FINNISH

Useat esimerkit todistavat jo YK:n kykyä toimia kriisitilanteissa tehokkaasti rauhan puolesta esiintymällä riitapuolten sovittelijana. Niinpä Palestiinan vihollisuudet päätyivät järjestön välitystehtävän onnistuttua. Suezin uhkaava tilanne rauhoittui, kun päästiin yksimielisyyteen Israelin, Englannin ja Ranskan joukkojen vetämisestä pois Egyptin alueelta ja korvaamisella YK:n vartiojoukoilla (UNEF). Suezin kanava, joka vihollisuuksien vuoksi oli suljettu, voitiin jälleen avata liikenteelle.

YK menestyi välityksellä ja sovittelutehtävässään myös Hollannin ja Indonesian vihollisuuksien yhteydessä Intian ja Pakistanin kiistellessä Kashmirin alueesta. Koreassa torjuttiin Korean tasavaltaa vastaan tehty hyökkäys ryhtymällä turvallisuusneuvoston suosituksesta yhteisvoimin sotilaallisiin toimenpiteisiin.

Kongossa YK on antanut panoksensa maan yhtenäisyyden säilyttämiseksi ja taloudellisten olojen vakiinnuttamiseksi.

Peruskirjan mukaan aseistariisun edistäminen kuuluu YK:n tärkeimpiin tehtäviin. Mielipideroavaisuudet niiden valtojen kesken, joista kehitys ensi sijassa riippuu, ovat kuitenkin jarruttaneet edistymistä. Yksimielisyyteen tällä alalla pyritään kaikin voimin.

"Atomi rauhan palveluksessa" on sekin merkinnyt YK:lle vaativaa työtä. Tuon uuden, mahtavan voimavarojen valjastamiseksi hyödyttämään ihmiskuntaa juuri rauhanomaisessa mielessä perustettiin Kansainvälinen atomienergiajärjestö. YK:n puitteissa järjestetty kaksi konferenssia ovat suuresti edistäneet pyrkimyksiä tämän alan yhteistoiminnan lisäämiseksi ja saavutettujen tulosten julkaisemiseksi.

Kun vuosituhansien aikana totuttiin pitämään sotaa ja puutetta elämänmenon luonnollisina osina samaan tapaan kuin säänmuutoksia ja maanjäristyksiä, on YK:n konkreettiset toimenpiteet rauhan hyväksi olleet erittäin merkkipantavia. Kimmokkeena sille, että kansakunnat opettelevat nyt ehkä kiihkeämmin kuin koskaan aikaisemmin elämään hyvinä na-

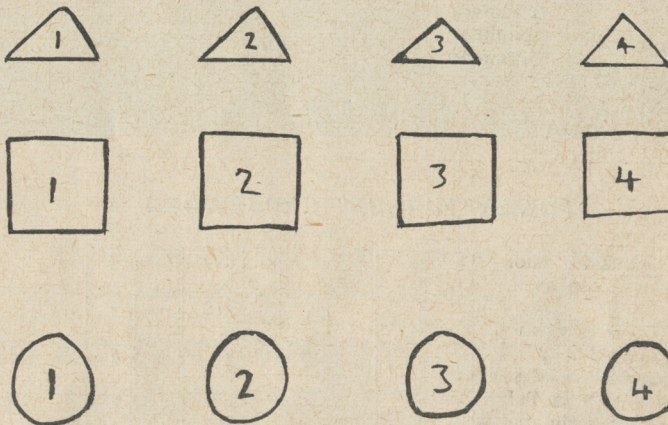

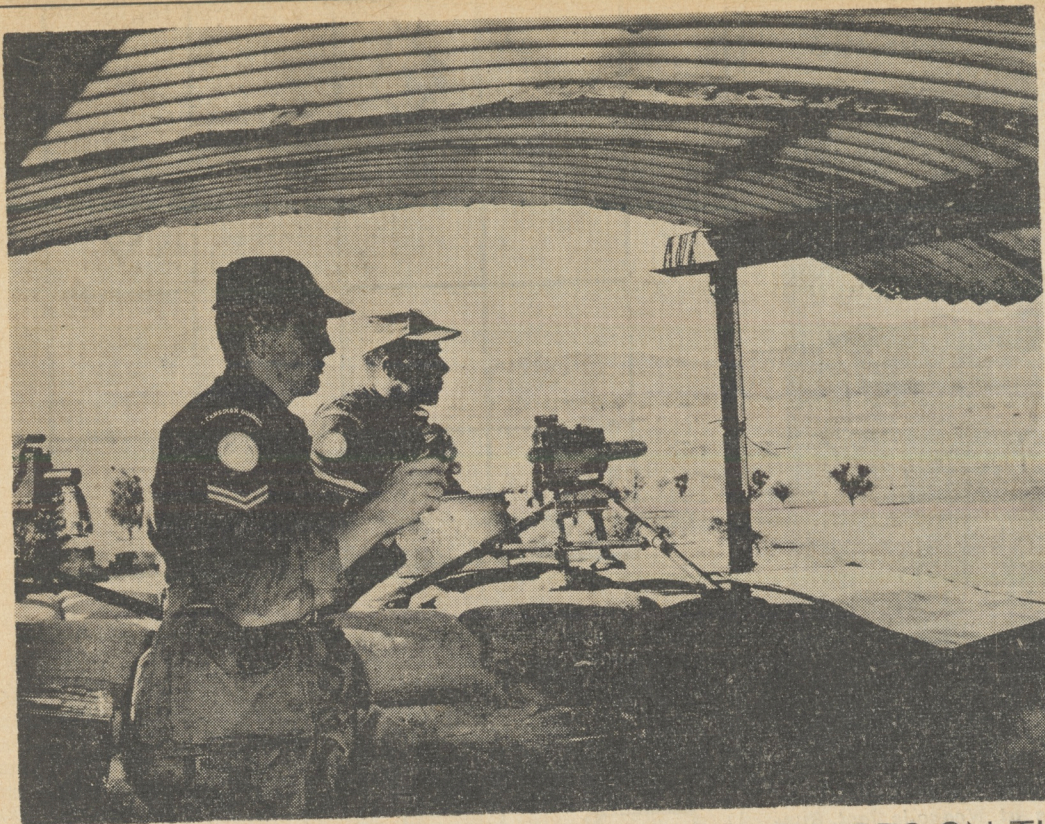

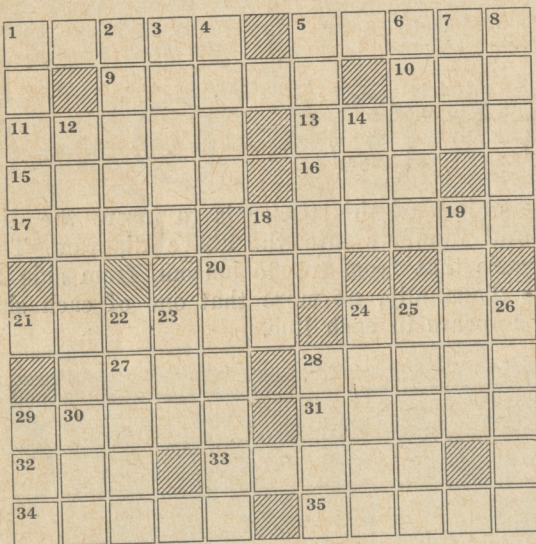
